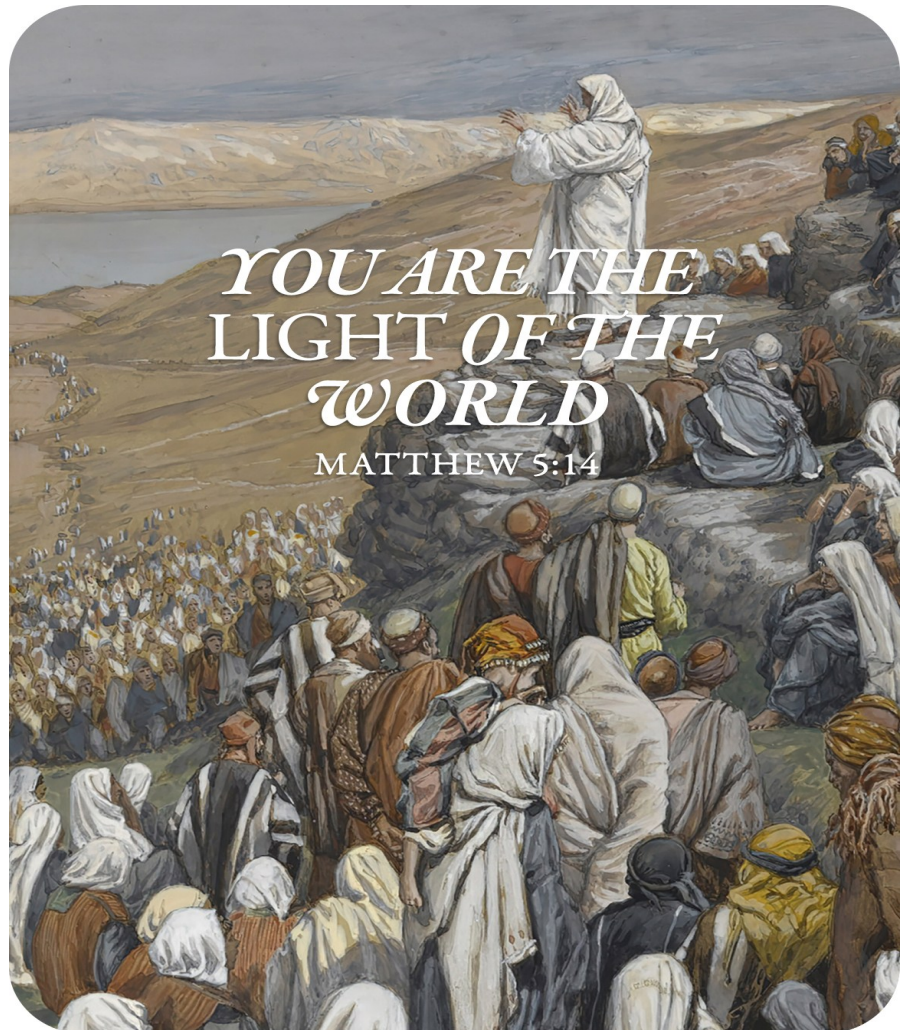

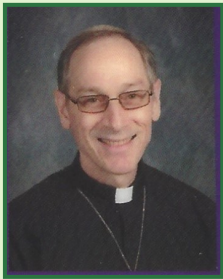

Fifth Sunday in Ordinary Time

Mission Statement

We, the people of St. Bavo Parish are committed to be the living presence of Christ in the world today.

Empowered by the Spirit, we strive to live our shared commitment through liturgical celebrations, prayer, education, spiritual growth, bearing witness to faith and service to all.



We have begun Week 3 of our reflections on Synod themes. Our topic this week is **Spiritual and Liturgical Life**, defined as “Living in Relationship with the Blessed Trinity.” Each of us has a personal relationship with God, but an essential part of it is our communal worship, i.e., the liturgical life of the Church.

The reflection booklet begins our exploration of this topic with the

scriptural image of Jesus standing at our door, knocking and waiting patiently for a response. Prayer is opening that door. In our private prayer, we have many tools at our disposal to facilitate an encounter with the Lord. There are traditional forms of prayer, like the Rosary, which many people find helpful and familiar. Scripture is another wonderful resource, especially the readings for the daily Mass. Many people also incorporate other types of spiritual reading into their prayer, turning to their favorite spiritual authors to guide them toward a deeper relationship with God. Intercessory prayer is also something that many people do daily, trusting as we do in the power of prayer to touch the lives of other people. And among all these forms of prayer, there is one that is, paradoxically, the simplest and the hardest to master: interior silence, in which there are no words, but only presence. In private, we have complete freedom to combine these different means of encountering God into a way that works best for us, and we can change our routine and try something new whenever we wish.

The Church’s liturgy, by contrast, is essentially the same every time. The fixed rubric and fairly strict liturgical norms allow worshippers to participate fully even when they are away from their home parish, or their home country, for that matter. Yet, the liturgy should always be fresh and engaging, because it constitutes a *new* encounter with Christ and with the community of believers every time. Every liturgy should be a genuine experience of *communion*, with Christ himself, and with our brothers and sisters *in Christ*.

The reflection questions this week touch on how we nurture our spiritual life, in private and in public worship.

How do I continue to grow in my relationship with God?

When do I talk to God? When do I listen to God?
When I pray, which person of the Trinity am I most often envisioning?

How do I prepare spiritually for Mass?

How well do I participate interiorly in each part of the Mass and exteriorly when called for?
How does my experience of the Mass affect my daily life during the week?

Do I feel equipped to make a good examination of conscience?

How often do I take advantage of the sacramental grace of Confession?

How does the pace of life or prevalence of digital technology/social media impact my ability to pray, to be contemplative, or to appreciate the value of silence?

When do I pray with others outside of liturgical prayer?

What is the role of intercessory prayer in my spiritual life?

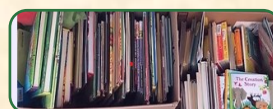
