



#### **Mission Statement**

We, the people of St. Bavo Parish are committed to be the living presence of Christ in the world today.

Empowered by the Spirit, we strive to live our shared commitment through liturgical celebrations, prayer, education, spiritual growth, bearing witness to faith and service to all.



Last week, the daily mass readings recounted stories from the Maccabean revolt in the second century B.C., when the Jewish people rose up against King Antiochus IV Epiphanes and (briefly) won their independence from foreign rule. This week, the readings provide a different look back at that same period of history. We hear stories

from the Book of Daniel, which were written to inspire the Jewish people during their struggle against King Antiochus IV. The stories feature a fictional prophet named Daniel, who supposedly lived three centuries earlier, during the time of the Babylonian Exile. Daniel sees visions and interprets dreams and signs. Through his prophetic gift, he is able to foresee the rise and fall of kingdoms that have not yet come into existence. In reality, though, all but the last of those kingdoms had already come and gone before the work was composed. The only one yet to fall was that of the present king, Antiochus IV. That was the whole point of the book, to encourage the Jewish people to hang on and not lose hope, for this would be the last foreign oppressor to rule over them. Unfortunately, the author didn't know that the Romans would come next.

Monday's reading, from the beginning of the Book of Daniel, provides the fictional setting for all the stories which follow. King Nebuchadnezzar of Babylon lays siege to Jerusalem and captures the city, taking away all the gold and sacred vessels from the Temple. The entire royal family and all of the Jewish nobility are also captured and taken to Babylon. Then the King orders his chief chamberlain to select some of the finest young men from among the captives and prepare them over three years to serve in his court. Daniel and his three companions prove to be the most outstanding candidates. They are also fiercely loval to their covenant with God, even while they are in exile and under the close scrutiny of the King's officials. This nearly gets them killed. Daniel is thrown into a den full of hungry lions, but he survives without a scratch. His three companions get thrown into a white-hot furnace, but they walk out without a hair on their heads being singed.

On Tuesday, Daniel is called in to interpret King Nebuchadnezzar's dream, in which he sees an imposing statue representing four successive kingdoms destroyed by a stone, which then grows into a great mountain and fills the whole earth. The first kingdom, represented by the golden head, is that of Nebuchadnezzar, and the last is that of Antiochus IV. The dream is meant to tell the readers suffering under Antiochus IV that his rule will end and the Kingdom of God which succeeds him will last forever. Daniel's later vision of the four beasts carries the same message. The four powerful earthly kingdoms all pass away, but then "One like a son of man" comes to establish a permanent Kingdom of the Most High, where God's holy people reside forever.




