



# **Mission Statement**

We, the people of St. Bavo Parish are committed to be the living presence of Christ in the world today.

Empowered by the Spirit, we strive to live our shared commitment through liturgical celebrations, prayer, education, spiritual growth, bearing witness to faith and service to all.



Today we begin the 33<sup>rd</sup> Week of Ordinary Time. As the end of the liturgical year nears, the daily gospel readings remind us of what transpired as Jesus approached and entered Jerusalem for the last time. When he reaches Jericho, hundreds of feet below sea level, to begin the long ascent through the desert up to Mount Zion, he's

greeted first by a blind man and then by a repentant tax collector. Both incidents demonstrate the healing that Jesus brings to those who come to him in faith. The blind man, freed of his affliction, becomes Jesus' follower. The tax collector, and many of his friends, discover the transforming power of God's mercy. However, through a parable, Jesus warns his disciples that they must use the talents given to them by God to build his Kingdom.

As Jesus reaches Jerusalem, he laments that the people he has come to save are oblivious to the sacrifice that he is about to make for them. Jesus' conflicts with the religious authorities intensify, signaling that the end is imminent. Fittingly, one of the first confrontations is about the nature of eternal life in heaven, the very reward for which Jesus is determined to give up his life.

As we watch these events in Jesus' time unfold, the first readings recount a different struggle that took place in Jerusalem roughly 200 years earlier, when the Jewish people had to rise up against a foreign ruler who tried to force them to abandon their covenant with God and assimilate into Greek culture. The story is told in the First and Second Books of Maccabees. After the death of Alexander the Great, his vast kingdom was divided up among his top generals. A few generations later, King Antiochus IV Epiphanes came to power in the region that includes Syria and Palestine. He decided to unite his kingdom by forcing all the conquered peoples, including the Jews, to worship the same gods and adopt the same customs. He even erected a statue of a Greek god in the Temple in Jerusalem. People who refused to obey the King's commands were tortured to death. We hear some of those stories this week.

First, an elderly scribe valiantly goes to his death, mindful of how his example would either inspire or scandalize those who held him in great esteem. There is also a horrible story about a woman and her seven grown sons, all of whom are tortured and killed in her presence. She encourages them to be brave, like her, and not give in to their oppressors. All of these young men profess their belief that God will raise them up after their deaths — a clear sign that belief in resurrection was becoming widespread in Judaism by this time. Eventually, a hero named Mattathias leads a successful revolt. He and his holy warriors drive out the King's soldiers and rededicate the Temple. The eight-day festival in 165 B.C. is commemorated to this day in the feast of Hanukkah.
